June 14 2020 :- Sunday Worship

What a joy it was to have Todd Wiebe back at SASS. Todd decided to connect this first week of "Ordinary Time" back to last week's sermon from Trinity Sunday. As such his text for this week was Ephesians 4:1-6.

As a prisoner for the Lord, then, I urge you to live a life worthy of the calling you have received. ² Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in love. ³ Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace. ⁴ There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to one hope when you were called; ⁵ one Lord, one faith, one baptism; ⁶ one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all.

Todd highlighted that Ephesians 4 MUST be read in the context, or better yet from the perspective, of Ephesians 1-3. From the theological heights of establishing the awesomeness and indescribableness of God, NOW live your life in that light. As such Todd encouraged us to see the good in people, because they are made in the image of God. Don't start with what is wrong with people, what is bad about them, start with what you see in them that is life giving. He also encouraged us to live our lives future focused, in the sense of Ephesians 1:10, to live believing and trusting that God is at work bringing about the mystery of His good will – "to bring unity to all things in heaven and on earth under Christ."¹ Finally Todd also challenged us to not divide the world in to "sacred" and "secular," in the sense of don't see the secular as bad. It's not, it's just life. After all, do we believe the words of Paul, in Ephesians 4:6 …

God is the Father of ALL, He is also over ALL, and through ALL, and in ALL.

Amen brother, Amen.

<u>Pastor Martin's Musings</u> <u>"The return of the PGA ... finally!"</u>



Sports are slowly but surely coming back. The Premiership begins the final leg of its season on June 17th. All being well the Reds will win their first Premiership by getting the two wins they need to secure the title, rather than earning the title by default, due to COVID-19. I have been a die-hard Liverpool fan since I could say "Kenny Dalglish." But

the sport that I have been most looking forward to seeing again on the TV is the PGA – Golf! I could watch golf all day, every day. 91 days have passed since the completion of the 1st round of the Players and then the PGA went into shutdown. 13 weeks of no golf. That is almost as bad as having no in-person worship services for the same period of time – right?

But this past Thursday, June 11th, the PGA tee'd off again at the Charles Schwarb Challenge in Fort Worth, TX. Rory is back – hallelujah. But things are different, and I am not referring to the extra 20 pounds Bryson is now carrying. There are no fans on the course. No grandstands, no "get in the hole", no handshakes at the end. Things are not as they seem after all. The PGA is back but not fully back. **Or maybe it is fully back but just not back the way it used to be.**

Isn't it strange how we get so used to the way things were that when the new way comes around, and it is ever so slightly different, it seems odd. But that's life, isn't it. Things happen that changes our situations and the new norm is never going to be like the old norm. At first we don't like it, because it just seems so foreign, but eventually we get used to it. Eventually we learn to adapt and cope.

I'm not too sure what my new norm is going to look like this summer when my mum goes back to the UK after being here through these strange times. But I take comfort in the fact that I will be able to adapt and learn to cope with whatever my new norm is.

But my NEW norm will never be like my OLD norm. It can't be!

For a lot of us we would love things to just go back to the way they used to be, the way they always were, before COVID-19. Through this pandemic experts have been saying that the new norm will have to be different for all of us for some time to come due to the fact that this virus is just not going to disappear overnight. I don't think any of us really wanted a new norm when we heard them say that. I think we all raised our resistance and said to ourselves "it will go back to normal, someday, sooner rather than later, but normal will return."

And then "George Floyd" happened, and the old normal was forever to be the old way never to return, God help us. People around the globe are protesting, and the major message that seems to be heard is "BLM." I think the cry that really needs to be raised worldwide is the cry of the Gospel – "justice."

Biblical justice is quite simply that people would live in right relationships with each other, with God and with the Creation. It is not a cry that the bad guys get what they deserve. Because if Biblical justice was that we would all have to get what we deserve. We would all have to face the judge and hear condemnation and a guilty verdict being issued to us. We would all have to face the punishment for our failings. But Biblical justice is a much bigger theme that does not end with us getting what we deserve. It includes God declaring the verdict on all of us and then He himself takes that verdict upon himself so that we don't have to, so that we can become in right-relationship with him and with each other again.

The new way is completely different from the old way, and we benefit from that. Whatever the new norm is going to look like in every town, city, province, nation, or country around the globe post COVID-19, I pray that it is more in line with the deep need and desire for true justice to reign supreme in the midst of all peoples. For that to happen it is not about anyone, any people, claiming their rights over and against any others. No! For justice to reign all people need to have the attitude of Jesus and humble themselves before him and each other realising that in Him is where we find the new norm, a better norm, the true norm.
