We focused our worship on

the Apostle Paul's prayer for God's people in Ephesians 3:14-21. Paul wants you and me to fully experience and live out of the love of God; God's essential essence. He prays that we would become filled to capacity with that love. If we are would that be sufficient fuel for these next six months? May the Triune God of grace fill us to the full measure of God Himself.



Competition Time




Last week's competition was for you to find the 24 books in the following paragraph.

Amen!



<u>Pastor Martin's Musings</u> "Who imagined the sun and gives source to its light?"



I mentioned Chris Tomlin's song "Indescribable" in my sermon on the Trinity. The verse in the song that just blows my mind every time I sing it is ...

Who has told every lightning bolt where it should go
Or seen heavenly storehouses laden with snow
Who imagined the sun and gives source to its light
Yet conceals it to bring us the coolness of night
None can fathom

Imagine! Imagine imagining the sun? Wow! Is there any wonder Tomlin sums up by saying "none can fathom." The sun is just so awesome, and the more we have of it these days the better. Right?

This past season I added some lights to my gardens, front and back. I bought some of those little cheap solar panelled lights that are more for decorative effect every night when the sun disappears.

Many years ago, the thought of powering lights by harnessing the power of the sun sounded like science fiction. Today, though, you can see solar panels dotting the rooftops of buildings and houses, as well as street lights in some cities. Have you ever stopped to wonder exactly how these cheap lights work? It's science! Solar lights work because of the photovoltaic effect. The most important part of a solar light is the photovoltaic or solar cell. It is the dark panel that converts sunlight into direct electrical current, that is stored up in the rechargeable battery. When the sunlight disappears a photoreceptor detects the darkness and turns on the LEDs that shine all night, powered by the charged battery. That's the theory.

But sometimes theory is not enough. Sometimes the battery for whatever reason does not get charged enough and so the light does not stay lit all night and the next night the charge is so small that the light hardly works at all. It's not the sun's fault.

What a failure of manufacturing. How can a solar light not harness enough of the awesomeness of the sun to store enough energy to power small LEDs for one night?

Here's the thing. I can complain all I want about my cheap solar lights that don't work that well. But I have a work around. I have rechargeable batteries that I can fully charge indoors and once they are inserted into the outdoor lights, those lights stay on all night

long. For a day or two. Because it's not the batteries fault. Something is wrong with the solar cell. It just does not do what it is supposed to do.

But my light "issues" have made me think about my life.

What if I am created to be a solar light? What if the sun is more than capable of supplying the necessary light that I need to store up and use to shine light in to the darkness. But sometimes I don't store enough power because I just don't spend enough time in the light. That causes me to work at a lesser capability than my potential.

I wonder if I spent more time in the Light of the Son would I be able to store sufficient power to shine His light?

I wonder.

Given I started this newsletter mentioning the Trinity, let me conclude with Paul's prayer for us. My prayer for us.

I kneel before the Father, ¹⁵ from whom every family in heaven and on earth derives its name. ¹⁶ I pray that out of his glorious riches he may strengthen you with power through his Spirit in your inner being, ¹⁷ so that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith. And I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, ¹⁸ may have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, ¹⁹ and to know this love that surpasses knowledge—that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God.

²⁰Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, ²¹ to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever!
